Apostrophes: _____

Insert a two apostrophes:

Hes running to his mums house with flowers.

Punctuation

Apostrophes are used to show
missing letters (omission) or
possession

Insert a two apostrophes:

He's running to his mum's house with flowers.

Punctuation

Brackets: _____

Insert a pair of brackets:

I went to visit Lily my best friend after dinner.

Punctuation

Brackets are used to add **extra information** that is not essential

Insert a pair of brackets:

I went to visit Lily (my best friend) after dinner.

Punctuation

Capital letters: _____

Insert three capital letters:

yesterday we all went to visit sadie in dorset

Punctuation

Capital letters are used at the
beginning of a sentence and for
proper nouns

Insert three capital letters:

Yesterday we all went to visit Sadie in Dorset

Punctuation

Colons: _____

Insert a colon:

I have two lessons this morning art and French.

Punctuation

Colons are used before an
explanation, a definition or to
introduce a list

Insert a colon:

I have two lessons this morning: art and French.

Punctuation

Commas: _____

Insert two commas:

Although it wasn't yet lunchtime he ordered
a drink some fruit and a meat pie.

Punctuation

Commas are used to **separate**
items in a list or to **separate parts**
of a sentence (i.e. clauses)

Insert two commas:

Although it wasn't yet lunchtime, he ordered
a drink, some fruit and a meat pie.

Punctuation

Dashes: _____

Insert a dash:

Steven won the race he's so fast!

Punctuation

Dashes are used to **separate** parts
of a sentence

Insert a dash:

Steven won the race – he's so fast!

Punctuation

Exclamation marks: _____

Insert two exclamation marks:

Wow mum I didn't know that

Punctuation

Exclamation marks show when
something is **surprising** or said
with **force**

Insert two exclamation marks:

Wow Mum! I didn't know that!

Punctuation

Full stops: _____

Insert a full stop:

I can't leave yet my homework isn't finished.

Punctuation

Full stops are used at the **end** of
a **sentence**

Insert a full stop:

I can't leave yet. My homework isn't finished.

Punctuation

Hyphens: _____

Insert a hyphen:

I have fifty two pound coins at home.

Punctuation

Hyphens link two or more **words**, often to make the meaning clearer

Insert a hyphen:

I have fifty-two pound coins at home.

Punctuation

Inverted commas: _____

Insert inverted commas:

It's nearly bedtime. Hurry up! shouted mum.

Punctuation

Inverted commas go around **speech** (what someone has said)

Insert inverted commas:

"It's nearly bedtime. Hurry up!" shouted mum.

Punctuation

Question marks: _____

Insert a question mark:

I am tired. Are you sleepy. Let's leave now.

Punctuation

Question marks show someone has **asked a question**

Insert a question mark:

I am tired. Are you sleepy? Let's leave now.

Punctuation

Semi colons: _____

Insert a semi colon:

He stood up it was time to leave.

Punctuation

Semi colons: link two complete **sentences** on the **same theme**

Insert a semi colon:

He stood up; it was time to leave.
