

Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

Future: for actions that will happen in the future

Uses 'will' and the verb.

Change to future tense:

He will walk down the road.

Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

<u>Past</u>: for actions that were completed in the past

Usually uses verbs with the 'ed' suffix.

Change to past tense:

He walked down the road.

Present: _____
Change to present tense:

He _____ down the road. (to walk)



Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

Present: For something that is happening now or generally happens frequently or regularly. Can describe habits or something that is generally true.

Change to present tense:

He walks down the road.

Tenses

Present progressive:		
Change to present progressive tense:		
Не	down the road. (to walk)	



Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

<u>Present progressive</u>: for actions that are **ongoing** now

Uses the **PRESENT** form of 'to be' and the **PRESENT** form of the main verb ('ing' ending)

Change to present progressive tense:

He is walking down the road.

Past progressive:		
Change to past progressive tense:		
Не	down the road. <i>(to walk)</i>	



Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

<u>Past progressive</u>: for actions that took place in the past over time

Usually uses the **PAST** form of '**to be**' and the **PRESENT** form of the **main verb** ('**ing**' ending) **Change to past progressive tense:**He **was walking** down the road.

Present perfect:		
Change to	present perfect tense:	
Не	down the road. (to walk)	



Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

Present perfect: for actions that started in the past and are still true
Usually uses the PRESENT form of 'to have' and the PAST form of the main verb ('ed' ending)
Change to present perfect tense:
He has walked down the road.

Quick-fire GPS recall

Tenses

Past perfect: for actions that have been completed in the past

Usually uses the **PAST** form of 'to have' and the **PAST** form of the main verb ('ed' ending)

Change to past perfect tense:

He had walked down the road.
